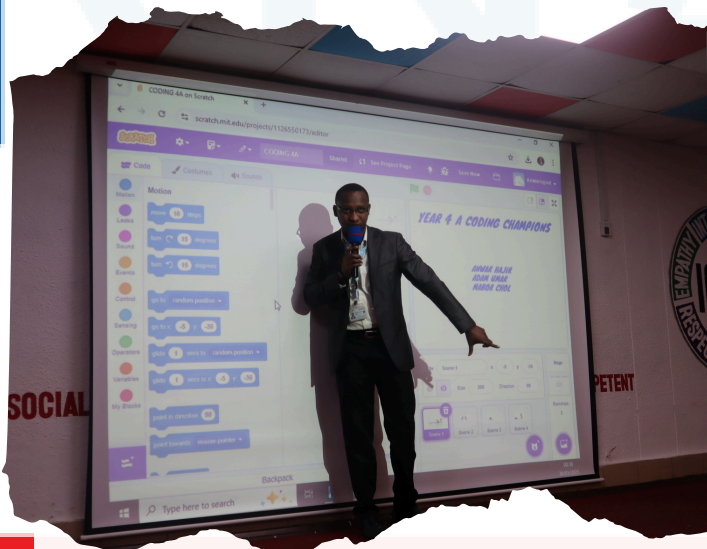
### Art Pieces and Fun Games
