KEY STAGE TWO AND THREE ASSEMBLY REPORT

Anti-Bullying Week was held at Light international Primary on 6th and 7th May 2025, led by the school counsellor, Ms. Yasemin Şeker. The initiative focused on promoting empathy, respect, and positive peer relationships, especially among Key Stage 2 (KS2) and Key Stage 3 (KS3) students. A variety of engaging and educational activities were delivered through assemblies and interactive sessions

Objectives

- To educate students about the impact of bullying and how to prevent it.
- To encourage empathy, respect, and inclusion among peers.
- To empower students to stand up against bullying through positive actions.
- To involve the entire school community in creating a safer environment.

Summary of Activities

1. Counsellor Presentation:

Ms. Yasemin Şeker delivered an engaging and informative presentation during KS2 and KS3 assemblies, focusing on types of bullying, its effects, and ways to prevent it.

2. Crumpled Paper Activity:

Students participated in the "crumpled paper" exercise to visually demonstrate how hurtful words and actions leave lasting marks, even after apologies.

3. Kindness Sticky Notes:

Each student wrote kind and encouraging words on sticky notes and placed them next to their peers' names, promoting positive affirmations and appreciation.

4. Anti-Bullying Pledge:

An anti-bullying pledge was read aloud by a group of students, with the remaining students repeating it in unison to show solidarity. The pledge was also signed by students, teachers, and non-teaching staff. It will be prominently displayed in the school compound.

5. Creative Student Contributions:

Several students read anti-bullying poems, sang a kindness-themed song, and performed a group dance to spread the message through artistic expression.

6. Poster Display:

Students showcased posters on stage during the assembly. School boards and corridors were also decorated with anti-bullying posters made by students and art teacher creating a vibrant and informative environment.

7. Dress Code for Unity:

To symbolize unity against bullying, students and staff wore white T-shirts throughout the week.

8. Introduction of the Buddy System:

Led by Ms. Yasemin Şeker, the Buddy System pairs older students with younger ones to provide guidance, friendship, and support—helping to reduce feelings of isolation and encourage peer mentoring.





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Outcomes and Observations

- High level of student participation and enthusiasm in all activities.
- Positive peer interactions increased following the activities.
- Staff noted more open conversations among students about bullying and kindness.
- Students expressed pride in contributing to the pledge and creative activities.

Recommendations

- Continue integrating anti-bullying awareness throughout the school year.
- Schedule regular follow-up assemblies and class-based discussions..
- Provide anonymous reporting options and regular counselling access for students in need.

The Anti-Bullying Week led by Ms. Yasemin Şeker was a significant and impactful initiative. Through collaborative efforts, creative expression, and meaningful pledges, the school community strengthened its commitment to standing united against bullying and creating a culture of kindness and respect.
